ISLAND GROVE PARK—ABINGTON TREASURE

Most of us in town are familiar with our Island Grove Park. We have walked on the bridge and looked north to see the new police station, or south where the stream flows under Centre Avenue into Whitman meadows. We have paused at the spillway and seen the mother duck with her ducklings eating in an area safe from the snapping turtles. In the spring, we have enjoyed the swans and the young of the Canada geese. We have stood on the fridge to try our hands at fishing, or to watch the July 4th fireworks. And generations of Abington folks have memories of swimming, boating and skating here.

The history of the park is probably well known. It was a meeting place for abolitionists, with William Lloyd Garrison a principal speaker, and is on the National Register of Historic Places. The 300 foot long bridge and the archway were erected in 1912. The archway has a bronze figure on each side—one of a sailor and the other a soldier—and is topped by an eleven foot bronze eagle. The inscription on the archway reads: "Abington To Her Sons Who Offered Their Lives For The Union" (continued on page 6)

OUTREACH-SHINE WITH NORMA

There will be many changes in health insurance and in Prescription Drug Plans in the New Year. Keep in mind that if you are unhappy with your Part D plan, you many change plans from November 15th to December 31st. Although Medigap plans (for example, BC/BS Bronzone or AARP, etc.) have continuous enrollment all year long, Medicare Advantage plans (such as HMO Blue, Tufts, Harvard Pilgrim, etc.) have specific times to enroll. Harvard Pilgrim Medicare plans will not be renewed in 2011, so if you belong to a Harvard Pilgrim Medicare plan, you need to select a new plan to be effective January 1, 2011 or you will have a Medicare only coverage **no RX coverage**. January 1, 2011 is not that far away, so please be aware if you need to make changes, NOW's the time to think about it.

If you haven't already heard, there will be no increase in Social Security Benefits in 2011. Sorry –maybe next year????

Island Grove Park needs the interest and support of our townspeople. The archway badly needs repair. Parts of it have eroded or been vandalized. Although the Park & recreation Department is hampered by a lack of funding and is unable to provide all of the necessary repairs and upkeep, the Park is still a wonderful place. Take a walk through. There is a main trail through the center and other walkways down to the pond. This park is a part of our town and we should all be proud of it and enjoy it. Do what you can to help.

General Information:

Island Grove Park is approximately 55.23 acres and is bordered by Central Street and Park Avenue. Island Grove Pond is a 38 acre artificial pond created in the 1700's by building a dam on the Shumatuscacant River. The pond is sand along the edges, with much in the deep areas and with abundant vegetation. The Park has been called "The Crown Jewel of Abington: and has long been an historic gathering spot. In the 1840's the Old Colony railroad built a siding in Abington to accommodate the special trains transporting people (as many as 10,000) from Boston to the famous "August First" abolitionist meetings in the Grove. FYI 3 QUESTIONS ON NOVEMBER 2

The following is provided for your reference and is according to the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Secretary of State's publication of voter information

Question 1—Sales Tax on Alcoholic Beverages: A NO Vote would make no change in the states sales tax on alcoholic beverages. A YES Vote would remove the states sales tax on alcoholic beverages.

Question 2– Comprehensive Permits for Low or Moderate Income Housing: A NO Vote would make no change in the state's 'Chapter 40B' statue. A YES would repeal the current law.

Question 3—Sales and Use Tax Rtes; A NO Vote would make no change in the state's sales and use tax rates. A YES Vote would reduce sales and use tax rates to 3%.

- -Two new names **Marjorie Edson** and **Barbara White** have been added to the donors plaque, the attractive one located on the wall of the inside hallway at the Senior Center. If you haven't noticed the plaque yet, stop and look at it on your next visit to the center. It's classy.
- Here's an obscure and often overlooked historical note for you,. A mechanically adept Herbert H. Buffman (originally from Hanover but moved to Abington in 1890) conducted a business here that constructed shoemaking machinery as well as various mechanical repairs. However in 1903 he built his first automobile and by 1906 had perfected his "Buffum Car" which at one time was considered the *finest eight-cylinder car in the United States*. His building surprisingly remains to this day and is the present day location of *locally famous Spencer's Pizza*


NOVEMBER'S CHUCKLE


WRAPPING PAPER REQUEST
